The complete ox-cart banked with fresh flowers, and assigned a place of distinction in the center of the main gallery, drew the attention and hearty admiration of all the throng. The entire exhibition was astonishing and amazing in its range and appeal as well as in the effective demonstration that it gave of the power and value of

Costa Rica as an influence which must not be over-looked in Contemporary Art History.

From the classical purity and perfection of Gonzalo Morales' "Portrait of Louis" and "Portrait of Cecilia", the paintings ran the entire gamut of style and subject to the mystic and romantic studies of Max Jimenez. There were admirable character and line value in the works of Manuel de la Cruz Gonzalez, L., especially his "Space' and "Negroes", and the Francisco Zuniga pieces, "Landscape" and "Three Women," were fascinatingly absorbing. Fausto Pacheco's "Punta Arenas" and "Landscape" were gaily tropical and colorful, while Teodorico Quiros' "Landscape" proved interesting and popular. The three paintings of Luisa G. Saenz displayed a sensitive and keen sympathy for her subjects, and Francisco Amighetti aroused extended enthusiasm with his oils and water color treatments of simple themes, effectively treated. Edwin Madrigal's Heredia scenes in water color were excellent in pattern and texture.

The exhibit as a whole would be a credit to any large gallery or institution in the United States or Europe, and as representative of the high achievement of a Central American nation whose cultural proficiencies are too little known or realized in this country, it may be said to be absolutely outstanding in the world of American art. It would be a major attraction in any great city of the world, and should draw an attendance of many thousands during its showing at the Rollins gallery. There is in the works a vibrant life, a feeling of the true artistic cosmic urge that underlies all culture fundamentally through the ages.

Florida is forever in debt to the artists of Costa Rica for this privilege of studying and admiring their brilliant work, and from this exhibition should come an creased understanding of the human aims and ideals basically inherent in the American common-

wealth of nations.

Among the most intriguing objects in the exhibit were the wood carvings of Nestor Zeledon, Juan Manuel Sanchez, and Juan Rafael Chacon, the first two represented by Christmas themes full of sub-lime suffering. Chacon's Christus in dark wood, of miniature propor tions, showed a senstive dignity and poise.

The formal opening of the new gallery was symbolized by a delightful ceremony in which the building contractor, Harry C. Cone, presented the keys of the new structure to Miss Jeannette Morse Genius, donor of the gallery, and Dr. and Mrs. George Howard Opdyke, who contributed to the wing of this latest addition to the Rollins physical plant. Following this Miss Genius gave the keys to President Holt who in turn entrusted them into the keeping of Professor Hugh McKean, Head of the Rollins Art Department, whose efforts were mainly responsible for

the Costa Rican exhibit. The gallery proves to be a worthy addition in the established and beautiful Mediterranean style of Rollins Campus architecture. Standing amidst great oaks and blooming azaleas by the shores of Lake Virginia, it forms the climax of an avenue all its own, a fitting conclusion to the architectural loveliness of Holt Avenue. lighting in the gallery is especially effective and was worked out by the engineers of the Westinghouse laboratories in Cleveland, Ohio, and aids materially in giving Rollins College the distinction of having the finest small art gallery in the South.
